A CHAT WITH OUR CEO

It's Bible Society's 220th anniversary. What's the most inspiring part of our history?

I think it's the intent of the Christians who started Bible Society. They were motivated by

a living faith. They believed that the Bible affected all of life and they practised that, for example, in prison and factory reform and the abolition of slavery.

How does Bible Mission differ 220 years on?

The main obstacles have changed. Back then, about 10 per cent of the planet could access the Bible in a language they understood. Now it's more than 90 per cent, and Bible Societies have produced the majority of the translations. So today it's an appetite-and-understanding problem, more than an access-to-the-Bible problem.

What do we learn from the past?

We can be inspired by the motivation and vision of our founders for the importance of the Bible, not only for an individual's vital relationship with Jesus, but also for change in whole societies. The faithfulness of the founders of Bible Society made a big difference in the world, and we can make a difference too.

What do you think Bible mission will look like 220 years into the future?

There may not be so much need for linguistic translations then, but there will always be a need for cultural translations. Every generation has to engage with the Bible and it is vital there is a generational transmission of this understanding. We are living in a time where we've had a generational failure of transmission so now we are in a very difficult position because there is a huge amount of ignorance. This is our responsibility now – to teach the next generation.

'I heard the gun shot. I watched my brother bleed to death. I carry that trauma,' Wilson tells me at the infamous Etapa II detention centre in Guatemala City. He was 14 when he saw his elder brother gunned down in front of him.

Wilson couldn't eat or sleep after the killing. He joined a gang and plotted revenge.

'I had a lovely relationship with my brother. We worked together, earning a few quetzal (Guatemalan currency) for carrying sacks of rice. We even used to go to church together.'

Wilson shows me a photo of when he was given a Bible at church at the age of 5.

After his 23-year-old brother was killed, Wilson turned his back on God. He was sitting on a porch with a friend when the police came. They found a gun on his

friend. They were both taken into custody.

Wilson has the number 18 tattooed on his arm. This indicates an allegiance to the notorious 18th Street gang, which has a membership of up to 50,000.

Seeking revenge

'Sometimes I left the house seeking revenge for my brother. But I heard a voice telling me don't do it and I now believe that voice was Jesus', says Wilson, who celebrated his 15th birthday the day before my visit.

I was at the Etapa II detention centre with the Guatemalan Bible Society team. It was one of the regular Open the Book days at the prison, where the team dramatises Bible stories with the inmates often joining in. Wilson is a little too shy for that, but he always attends, absorbing the

stories that point to the hope and love and forgiveness that can only be found in Jesus.

'As soon as I heard Bible stories were being shared in the prison I wanted to come,' he said.

He tells me he particularly likes hearing stories about how God never abandons his children. Hearing him say this reminds me once again that Wilson is

When migrant workers arrive in the Gulf to take up low-paid jobs as housemaids or construction workers they are often entering a world of pain.

Desperate to earn money to send back to their impoverished families in the Indian sub-continent, Africa or elsewhere, they put their physical and mental health at risk. It's been reported in the media that men endure harsh working conditions on construction sites and housemaids have intense workloads.

The good news is that more and more of them are finding peace and hope in Christ, and Bible Society supporters are crucial to this. Your kind giving provides Bibles to these people, your generosity trains church workers and Bible storytellers to help guide them.

The most recently completed End to End project engaged migrant workers from the Telugu community. Telugu speakers from India make up the largest expatriate community in Bahrain.

'It is a process for fulfilling the Great Commission by allowing unreached people to watch, listen, read, and experience the transformative power of the gospel. Together, we're bringing people into the kingdom of God through the word of God,' says Hrayr Jebejian, General Secretary of Bible Society in the Gulf.

Pastor John Wesley (what a wonderful name!) leads a pentecostal Telugu congregation mostly made up of domestic helpers and construction workers. They toil long hours to support their families back home while they live in abject poverty and hopelessness. John and his wife Kalyani visit 19 labour camps on

a regular basis to minister to these individuals.

'We receive many resources such as audio and printed Bibles, Scripture portions, discipleship through storytelling. Our volunteers are equipped to reach the unreached. We have many challenges at the camps – lack of permission to enter, unfriendly guards, antagonistic people who try to disrupt, and no space for meetings. Sometimes, we just stand outside in the open air. Kindly pray for the people being reached,' says John.

Heartwarming testimonies from migrant labour camps in Bahrain

'I am from India. I got married at 13 and had my first child at 14. My husband is addicted to alcohol and he beat me up. To take care of my family and educate my two children I borrowed money from people and arrived in Bahrain. Life is hard here. I work in people's houses and some of them do not treat me well. I used to worry about everything and get angry but then I encountered the End to End project. I am illiterate, so I was very happy when they gave me an audio Bible. Listening to the word of God changed my life. I feel God speaking to me in my ear. I try to apply all the lessons I learned in my own life. I don't worry or get angry now because I know God loves me. The pastor and his wife visit us, listen to us and teach us the word of God.'

Marian

'Our families are in India. We are allowed to go home maybe once every two years. We have little material possessions, but I have the costliest gift of all – my Bible!'

Narasimha

'We came to Bahrain to earn some money and send home so that our children will not be illiterate like us. Pastor told us that he would show us a film. We were overly excited, thinking it may be one of the latest Hollywood ones. When we watched the Jesus film in Telugu, most of us were crying. We think our life is full of struggles and problems. After I saw the film, I realised that Jesus went through worse things, even torture. Then Pastor gave us audio Bibles. When I call home, I tell my children stories from the Bible. I have begun attending church, and I hope I will be able to be baptised soon. It is a joy for me to be able to learn about Christ and try to be like him.'

Prasad

'We went to minster to a group of ladies. One was having an anxiety attack. She was worried about her children back home while struggling to make ends meet. We prayed and laid hands on her after which she felt relieved and rested. We are thankful for God's intervention.'

220 years of Bible mission: thank you!

To mark 220 incredible years of Bible ministry, we look back through the decades – and explore the challenges and opportunities of today ...

It's 1800 and young Mary Jones sets out from her home in the Welsh mountains. She hears Bibles are for sale in Bala. So she walks, all 26 miles, to buy one with money she's been saving for years.

The story is legendary – but, still, it's amazing to consider the huge impact this teenage girl has had on the world ...

A few years later, inspired by Mary, Bible Society was formed. Since then, with support from you and others, we've produced most of the world's Bible translations and about 80 million Bibles are printed every year.

More to do

But even after 220 years of fruitful ministry, our task is not yet complete. The landscape has changed beyond recognition since 1804 – but your support is as vital as ever.

Now, you can carry a whole Bible in your pocket (on a smartphone), but in England and Wales, 86 per cent of people never or hardly ever read the Bible. Christianity is

a minority religion, according to the 2021 census, and it's declining across Western Europe.

Gospel opportunities

Despite this, opportunities for Bible mission are everywhere.

Here in the UK, there's real openness towards faith. A Bible Society survey showed that, rather than being hostile, most people are indifferent or even curious about religion. A quarter of adults in England and Wales even want to know more about the Bible. Around the world, the church is growing in places like Africa as more people have Scripture in their language.

Bible engagement

So the task today is no longer about making the Bible available, it's about Bible engagement.

Our job is to help Scriptures become a channel for people to encounter the living God. We want Christians to put Bible mission at the heart of what they do, and we want the Bible to inform influential conversations about living a good life. Your support is helping to meet the challenges and opportunities before us, including:

- Producing resources for Christians such as The Bible Course and The Romans Course
- Reaching people formerly excluded from the 'Biblereading norm', like people in prison or with disabilities (see page 3)
- Scaling up the work to share the Bible with schoolchildren through storytelling
- Connecting with politicians and leaders to show the Bible has something to say about life

Thank you for being part of the Bible Society story. Please continue to support and pray for Bible mission in great anticipation for the decades to come.

God's word at work in Africa

Your support is powerfully at work across Africa, meeting urgent needs and sharing the Bible in new ways. You're giving hope to those in crisis and introducing Jesus to people for the first time. Here are three ways you're making Jesus known in three different countries.

Dozens of people who are passionate about God's word have twinned their Bible with the soon-to-be-published Kabiye Old Testament. Their donation of £60 supports translators and each donor receives a bookplate to go in their own Bible.

Kabiye is Togo's second national language, spoken by around a million people. Believers there love the New Testament, but when it comes to teaching the Old Testament, preachers are working with Scriptures in French (the official language) or Ewe (one of the national languages).

'It has been difficult to translate and transmit the Bible's message in Kabiye,' said Ruben, a church leader. 'It can be hard to explain traditions and why as Christians we shouldn't do certain things.'

'When the Bible is translated,' said Ruben, 'It will be easy to help Kabiye people understand how to live out their new lives in Christ for the glory of God.'

Music in Mali

Mali is Muslim-majority, has low levels of literacy and a very young

population. It also has a distinct musical tradition. In the decades following Mali's independence, the National Instrumental Ensemble toured the world, bringing Malian music to new audiences.

One audience these styles are beginning to reach is the country's Christian congregations. Up to now, churches have largely done without traditional music, which has only strengthened the notion that Jesus is foreign and irrelevant.

With your support, Mali's Bible Society team is teaching folk musicians to sing Scripture in local dialects.

After a performance in the capital, Bamako, Pastor Thera André, said, 'It's touched me a lot. This programme must continue and reach all peoples and ethnicities in Mali so that everyone hears the holy words of God and participates in them.'

Baptist leader Dr Mohamed Ag Infa Yattara added, 'This kind of event would have been impossible before.'

Emergency aid in Sudan

Sudan is chronically unstable. In 2011 it experienced an extraordinary demographic change when its southern states, where Christians were the majority, gained independence

and became a separate country, South Sudan. This means Sudan is 97 per cent Muslim and a tough place to be a Christian, especially since last year when tensions erupted into civil war.

'I think this is the most difficult time I have experienced since I started working with Bible Society in Sudan,' said Revd Ismail Abdulrahman Kanani, who leads the team there. Some of his staff have been driven from their homes, others have fled violence and some have even been evicted. 'I am trying to connect all the staff from different locations, some in the country and others abroad.'

Earlier this year, supporters of Bible Society in England and Wales provided £10,000 as an urgent response to this crisis. Your practical support is helping Ismail hold his team together and restore their Bible outreach programmes.

Togo

Population, 9 million

Togo is a founding member of La Francophonie, a group of nations in which French is a first, official or culturally significant language.

In 1961, Togo's first presidential election was won by Sylvanus Olympio with 100 per cent of the vote. Olympio was assassinated two years later.

Mali

Population, 22 million

Mali takes its name from the Medieval Islamic Malian Empire, having been called French Sudan under colonial rule.

It's home to Timbuktu, an ancient desert city that became an object of fascination for Europeans, who considered it an African El Dorado.

Sudan

Population, 50.5 million

The modern Republic of Sudan, south of Egypt, covers an area that the Bible calls Cush.

The Nile is Sudan's main source of water, and it runs right through the country.

Paul's letter to the Romans is the theological equivalent of a mountain: majestic, challenging and complex. If you've taken *The Romans Course* or read Andrew Ollerton's book, *Romans: A Letter That Makes Sense of Life*, you'll know that. But you haven't seen that mountain physically climbed – until now.

With the help of two expert climbers and a courageous videographer, Andrew documented his longest sustained multi-pitch climb as a way to share the gospel. Andrew weaves together teaching from Romans and what it means to follow Jesus as he crosses valleys, traverses glaciers, and reaches breathtaking heights.

More than anything, Andrew

wanted this experience to highlight the relationship that exists between faith and the outdoors.

'Too often the Christian faith is synonymous with a sort of indoor religion,' Andrew says. 'I wanted to reach the outdoors community and ask, "What if faith was less like attending a church service, and more like going on an adventure?"'

Winning the outdoor community

'For a lot of people Christianity has only ever been like a religious map, a moral guide, this ethical, abstract idea,' Andrew says. 'But what if the real experience of Christianity is the mountain, not the map?'

Andrew wanted to make the connection between faith and the outdoors more obvious for people who love to spend time in nature, but still see faith as separate from that – a one-dimensional experience. What if people who haven't given up on the idea that there is a God, and that their lives have a purpose, could see that God can be encountered in wild places and through the beauty of the world he has made?

The living word of God

And what about the Bible? What if people who are turned off by formal, institutional religion could realise that the Bible isn't just a moral handbook, confined to religious settings, but the living, breathing word of God?

What if faith was less like attending a church service, and more like going on an adventure?"

'I like the idea, even on camera, of people seeing the Bible read not in a church service or a school assembly, but on a ridge or in the snow,' Andrew says. 'The story of Scripture mostly unfolds in outdoor environments and can be engaged with outside of a church building.'

The hope, Andrew says, is that this video would be an encouragement that God is someone who can be found in creation. 'We hope people will watch it and share it with their friends or communities that are into the outdoors. Church groups or centres can watch it together and have a discussion off the back of it, then share it with people they've been out climbing, canoeing or skiing with who don't know Jesus yet.'

A mountaintop miracle

'I wear contact lenses when I'm filming, and on the first night of our two-day journey I lost my contact lens in my eye,' Andrew shares. 'We tried to flush it out, but we couldn't get hold of it. When I woke up in the morning my eye was red and sore, and we all agreed I needed to go to hospital. I was gutted because I knew we didn't have a film – we hadn't been to the summit.

'Andy put his hand on my shoulder and prayed a simple prayer, and when I opened my eyes something felt different. He looked at my eye and said that it wasn't red anymore. Within five minutes I had a new contact lens in — I still don't know what happened to the other one — and we turned around and started back up the mountain. It was a reminder to me that God is with us in these natural spaces just as much as he is in a church building.'

just a child himself, yet he has experienced so much in his life.

Etapa II houses up to 300 young men. Most are on remand awaiting trial, a process that can take up to seven years. Each cell holds between five and eight prisoners. The windows have no glass, just bars, so as we walk through we hear shouting from inside.

Prison riot

Five years ago the detention centre was in the news when two guards were killed in a prison riot.

The Bible Society team has built up a strong relationship with the prison officers and has been visiting regularly since 2011, bringing Scriptures, and more recently, sharing Bible stories through the Open the Book programme, which is supported by your kind giving in England and Wales.

Bible Society recently ran a football tournament at the

communities, families and

prison which was so popular that 100 boys took part. During the tournament a worship session was held and many of the young men are now attending weekly Bible study and praise gatherings. Again, all this work by the Bible Society in Guatemala is supported by your generosity.

I watched three Open the Book sessions in the courtyard. About 20 prisoners came to each one, accompanied by 11 guards. They'd start each session by sprinting up and down the courtyard, laughing together. Then there's a prayer and a talk about the topic of the week, which is always related to a biblical value, such as forgiveness. After a Bible story there is a Q&A session, followed by prayer requests. The boys usually pray for their families, for the trial they will face, and they also ask for protection and that they won't be transferred to one of Guatemala's harsher prisons. It ends with the Bible Society team giving each young man a

slice of Domino's pizza, which is a real treat.

'I want to save lives'

Wilson tells me he doesn't seek vengeance for his brother anymore.

'Now I know that things like vengeance are in God's hands and my life is in God's hands too,' he says.

I ask him what are his hopes for the future.

'I want to be somewhere with better opportunities. I want to be a doctor so I can save lives,' he says.

For the first time ever, and thanks to your support, the whole Bible has been made available in a dyslexia-friendly format.

The Bible Society initiative began in 2015 with the book of Psalms and the Gospel of Mark, and it's now been completed with the recent publication of Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy and Joshua.

People with dyslexia can struggle to read and write easily because they don't deal well with text on a page. Around six million people in the UK – one in ten of the population - are thought to have the condition. Reading the Bible can be particularly challenging as Bibles are often produced on thin paper in densely printed type.

Reducing visual clutter

The books in the dyslexia-friendly format are laid out like novels rather than in traditional columns and use shorter paragraphs. The larger, sans serif typeface with

more space between the lines helps to reduce visual clutter. The books use thick paper so words don't show through from the next page and a matt, rather than glossy, finish minimises light reflection.

Clair Natt, who has dyslexia, says: 'I struggled reading the Bible because the words are so small and the pages are really thin. I just found it really difficult to read; it's just too complicated for me to comprehend and understand.'

A transformative experience

Reading Scripture in the Good News Bible Dyslexia-Friendly edition has transformed her experience, she says.

'The Dyslexia-Friendly Bible's really helpful because it's more spaced out, the words are bigger and it's just easier to read. And it was broken down with pictures as well. which I liked.'

Bible Society's publishing director

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
