## The life cycle of the Bible

The range of articles in this edition of your magazine illustrates the breadth of activities that Bible Society is involved with, which we call the 'life cycle of the Bible'.

It begins with translation into a language that people understand. The article on page 14 illustrates how that work is always ongoing because languages change over time and there are new textual discoveries, in this case from the Dead Sea Scrolls. We always want to translate those findings to keep the text up to date with scholarship, presented in understandable wording and fresh for each generation of readers.

Then, the Bible needs to be printed and distributed. It's the world's best-seller and there's always demand for more. Quite often, moments of extremity see people drawn to the Bible. We see that in the story about Iranian migrants. Migrants coming to the UK and being given a Bible by a church can be a special thing, especially when these people come from countries where the Bible may not be so easily available.

After that, when communities of believers settle down, whether in England, Egypt or China (see the featured stories from those countries), there is a need for teaching and for leaders and Bible communicators to be trained to help others read and understand the Scriptures.

And finally, it is only when the text goes from being in our hands to being in our minds and hearts that transformation takes place.

So, all of our work is aimed at that goal of a deeper encounter and engagement with the Scriptures for each person that we reach.

Egypt. Just the name has incredibly alluring power. Close your eyes for a moment, if you would, and see what comes to mind when you think of that place.

My mind conjures images of a blazing sun, shifting sands, glittering gold artefacts, and pyramids as old as history itself. Perhaps we also think of bustling markets and exotic Middle Eastern food, and (for the modern Brit!) relaxing days by the beach in Sharm el Sheikh.

But Egypt has another side, one which can be largely hidden beneath those better known and more visible layers. You see, Egypt has a rich and enduring Christian heritage. Your support today is vital in growing and maintaining the many amazing Bible projects that build on that heritage.

I visited Cairo this year and saw some of those projects

first-hand. I was moved by the dynamism and the boldness of our Bible Society of Egypt colleagues as they share their love for the Bible with as many people as they can. They particularly focus on reaching out to young people and do so through innovative digital work, making the Bible accessible through apps and audio, a hugely successful programme that has been supported by you for many years.

#### **Growing in faith**

Egypt is not a majority Christian country. There are believed to be up to 15 million Christians in a population of 111 million. These Christians have a deep love for Jesus and a real hunger for the Scriptures.

With your support, Bible Society of Egypt hopes to distribute about 115,000 heavily subsidised Bibles and New Testaments in 2025. Vast amounts of these 66

affordable Scriptures are purchased by church leaders, evangelists and others, and given to people for free. Last year, just over 115,000 were distributed.

This is critical because Egypt's economy has suffered a lot in recent years. Without that discount many people couldn't afford a Bible at all.


#### More Bibles needed

Wherever I went in Egypt, ministers spoke of the incredible need for more Bibles. Last year, the demand for Bibles was nearly three times the supply!

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## A thank you from Egypt

One amazing Christian hub where this distribution takes place is known as the Cave Church complex in Cairo, where we met Sara who was a recipient of one of those Bibles. I was moved by how she clutched her Bible to her chest in one of the vast cave churches and eagerly opened it to show us each of the passages that meant so much to her. Her fingers moved effortlessly through the pages, knowing instinctively where to find the words that gave her so much life. It was clear that the Bible she had received was much more than just a book; it was a companion that she had

become deeply familiar with.

#### Lives transformed

And the work doesn't stop when people receive a Bible. One of the most successful Scripture initiatives in Egypt has been the training of men and

women to lead inductive Bible study groups. This has spread throughout the country and led many people to deepen their engagement with Scripture through a simple contextual reading of Bible passages. These Bible studies have been especially attractive to young people, helping them to see how ancient stories can make sense of and transform their lives today.

Carol, aged 20, has engaged with the Bible study programme and learnt simple techniques that help her to read the Bible in context and apply it to her life, lifting the stories off the page and making them real to her. She told us: 'Now I know God.'

Later, I was in a room full of people who were from one of the Bible study groups in a Coptic church. I asked them a question that I often ask groups: 'What is your favourite Bible passage?' If I'm honest, there are a few passages that come up again and again, and they often come from the gospels. I was humbled, though, when

almost every hand in the room shot up and for the next half an hour or so, people came forward to share passages from across the whole Bible, from Leviticus to Hebrews, from the Psalms to Song of Songs. The Bible study process had opened up the riches of God's word for these people in deeply profound ways.

'The way I read the Bible has completely changed,' Demana told us in a Bible study group at Abusaifayn Coptic Church. 'As I apply the word to my life I have become a different person,' she added.

'Before, I had no explanations,' added Mahir. 'I was shallow in my faith. Now I understand and I have grown in my faith,' he said.

#### Living through the Bible

My most memorable moment happened at the same event when one person came forward with their Bible and handed it to me. I opened it and let out a quiet gasp. Without exaggeration, every line of every page of her dogeared and wellread Bible was full of highlights, underlining and personal notes. She lived in and through her Bible, a life given birth through the study she followed thanks to your generous support.

Now, when I close my eyes, the image of pyramids bathed in a golden sun recedes and is replaced by that little Bible full of underlining and the person living out its words. Your support helped that to happen, and your continued support transforms more and more lives by the power of God's word.

At a small church in the South West of England, a young man who recently arrived from Iran receives his first Bible. He almost can't believe what he's touching. 'If they see you holding a Bible like this in Iran,' he says, 'They'll kill you.'

You'll find churches at the forefront of welcoming new arrivals – wherever they've come from. The charity Welcome Churches, a Bible Society partner that now has more than 1,300 member congregations, has been working since 2018 to see every refugee welcomed by a church.

A great example of a welcoming church is the small congregation in which the young man quoted above was one of many to receive a free Bible.

The church asked us not to name it because they're concerned for the safety of their Iranian members. (The British government's latest sanctions against Iran were introduced in response to violence and threats against Iranians in Britain and their families in Iran.)

More than two-thirds of the people attending this church on a Sunday are now Iranian.

#### A welcoming church

'Hotels around here are filled up with asylum seekers,' the church's minister said. 'Word got around that this was a welcoming place in an otherwise hostile environment. And we've gone from a congregation of thirty people to a hundred in three years.'

And the Bible is turning curious visitors into church members. Migrants are coming for the welcome, and then staying for the word.

Chantelle Baker, Bible Society's Community Engagement Manager, says, 'We work with churches and detention centres to make sure that Bibles are supplied, free of charge, to those who want them.'

For a refugee to read the word of God is one thing, but for God to speak the language they grew up with is a great blessing.

The Iranian government prohibits the printing and distribution of Christian resources in Farsi, Iran's native and official language. So people leaving the country in huge numbers means huge numbers of people suddenly gaining free access to Scripture.

'It's so wonderful to read and pray in my own language,' said an Iranian at the church. He'd been curious about the Bible and read bits online, eventually receiving an easy-to-read edition of the Bible in modern Farsi.

#### Darius' story

'My father had a stroke and one of my best friends came to the hospital and prayed. I said, "Why are you praying like that? Have you become a Christian?" He said, "Yes". Soon after, my father got better.

'It's really dangerous to introduce someone to Christianity in Iran. My friend invited me to his Bible class in his home, but he had to be careful because the security services try to infiltrate such meetings.

'I only went to watch. I didn't accept new things easily. But they said God is love. I thought in religion there was a lot of war, but Jesus says when somebody hits you, turn the other cheek. For me that's really amazing. Forgiveness rather than revenge.

'Love your God; love your neighbour. It really touched my heart. At the class one day, I told them I want to be Christian. They said, "We don't baptise in this country, but read this prayer." I prayed and became a Christian.

'I'm applying for asylum here because my life is at risk. After I left Iran, they found Christian resources in my home. If I went back, I'd be arrested, and they'd use me to track down the Bible class.

'I have been given a free Bible in Farsi, which is amazing. My favourite verse is 1 John 4.16. God is love. Jesus said forgive your enemies. He sacrificed himself. I used to chant, "Death to America," but now I pray for peace.'

Dear Margaret from Cumbria, thank you for the recipe printed in the Bible Society's winter edition of Word in Action, which I have just cooked. (Only now do I have enough space to publish this letter. Margaret had sent in a Scripture-inspired recipe she called 'Abraham and Sarah's Happy Meal' – Simon.)

I am 85 and have been widowed for over ten years and this is the most ambitious meal I have ever done. My wife had the kitchen as her domain. After my wife died, I received so much church hospitality that I partly returned it by cooking this meal for three friends. I did all the preparation including digging up and slicing my own leeks.

I have a PhD in Chemistry and cooking is chemistry, so my new role wasn't as difficult as it might have been. Chemistry, at its simplest, involves mixing weights of A and B, and heating at a certain temperature for a certain time. What my wife's hand-written cookery books lacked was temperature and time (the information was presumably in her head). That was the primary obstacle to overcome.

This was my first main meal in about four months as I have had a series of minor operations. One of my friends had seconds and there are three generous meals in the fridge and freezer for future days. The centre of my biggest casserole dish was piled about two inches higher than the rim, and golly, what a lot of washing up!





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## **Window into China**

There is only one ordained minister for every 6,700 believers in China. That's why your support of our pastor training programmes is vital.



Longtan in rural south-eastern Chongqing is an ancient town rich in history and diverse ethnic cultures, especially those of the Tujia and Miao ethnic minority groups.

In Chinese, Longtan means 'ponds in the shape of dragon's eyes' as the old town is located between two such bodies of water. The town might be famous for its mutton noodles washed down by hot, spicy tea, but it is also home to a community of steadfast Christians.



It's not the richest town in China by any means, but these people are content. If you look at their Bibles you'll get an indication of why. The books are battered as the pages have been turned so many times.

Our Chinese colleagues recently visited Longtan and each photo reveals its own little story.

#### Blessed with a leader

The Longtan Christians are blessed with a leader to help guide them through the Scriptures, but did you know that in China it's estimated there is only one ordained minister for every 6,700 Christians.

And no matter how many leaders are trained, the need remains great, because so many people are coming to faith. Your continuing generosity means more and more young people can be trained as pastors and lay preachers.

Over the years millions of Bibles have been distributed

in China, but these Christians need leadership. There are many reports of cults taking advantage of the situation and leading Christians astray. One way of stopping this is to train more and more ministers.

#### **Training young ministers**

The training of young, energetic Chinese ministers will not only be a massive blessing to Christian communities in rural areas such as Longtan, but will also help our Bible mission in China make greater inroads into the cities to connect with young people who often migrate there to work.

#### Bible engagement

The Church in China is growing with an average of 500,000 baptisms and more than one million people joining local fellowships every year. All these new believers need Bibles and trained ministers to lead their churches and help them engage with the Scriptures.



'I used to feel like the most shameful person – being poor and looked down upon by others,' says Zhao Pingxian. 'Now that I've studied the Bible, I'm not afraid of others' judgment. I just want to follow Jesus. Jesus is my only Saviour.'

Zhao, 75, grows vegetables in Longtan for a living, but she often wondered about the true meaning of life. She got sucked into a cult that offered empty promises of redemption and also put her trust in fortune tellers. None of it worked out.

When she was confined to bed by illness and unable to tend her crops, she despaired. Then she was visited by members of the Christian community.

They shared the gospel with her and Jesus healed her wounded spirit. She started attending church.

Zhao recently received a Bible from her church's pastor and every morning as the sun rises she can be found reading it.

'The burden of my past struggles started to lighten, replaced by a newfound sense of joy and contentment found in God's word,' she says.

90 million Bibles have been printed at Amity Printing Press in Nanjing, China for distribution in China since 1987 (when Bible Society helped establish the printing press).



## Important new edition of NRSV is now available

The New Revised Standard Version Updated Edition (NRSVue) British edition is a brilliant tool for Bible students and church leaders.



Bible Society has produced an updated edition of the New Revised Standard Version that takes into account new information collected from studying the Dead Sea Scrolls.

'A revision was needed because a lot has changed in how we use the English language, and in Bible scholarship since the NRSV came out in 1989,' said Derek Hill, Managing Director of Bible Society's Resources Ltd.

He described the New Revised Standard Version Updated Edition (NRSVue) British edition as 'an excellent resource for Bible students, preachers and those preparing Bible study groups.'

The NRSV is very popular and is often used in Bible colleges. It is the Bible with the broadest range of scholarship and the widest ecumenical acceptance.

The Society of Biblical Literature\* was asked to create an updated edition of the NRSV. About fifty scholars from different denominations reviewed the text.

The revision of the NRSV is a great resource for Bible students, preachers and those preparing Bible study groups."

It includes updates made as a result of decades of scholarship of the Dead Sea Scrolls. As a result some words and phrases had been added from the scrolls, mainly in the early books of the Old Testament, where there is consensus that it helps the text make more sense.

They also added in more scholarly notes and a lot more cross-references.

The NRSV is published in the UK by four publishers: Bible Society, Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge (SPCK), Oxford University Press and Cambridge Bibles. These four agencies worked together to adapt the NRSVue from American to British English.

The four publishers also produced a common table of weights and measures so you can compare ancient biblical, imperial and metric measurements, which is not in the American edition.

The Bible Society edition is the same text as that produced by SPCK, Oxford and Cambridge, but also includes a free concordance. You can get it from our online shop.

'I am the door. If anyone enters by me, he will be saved and will go in and out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly' (John 10.9–10, NIV). When Jesus says, 'I am the door,' he is inviting us into a life of salvation, abundant grace, and unending protection.

Once, despite being a Christian, I found myself spiritually adrift. It was through an Alpha course that the powerful message of John 10.9–10 transformed my life. I realised I was like a lost sheep, aimlessly wandering without the guidance and protection of Jesus. That revelation was a game changer, reshaping my entire existence and making Jesus the central focus of all I did.

Later, I was blessed with the opportunity to work with Bible Society. I've witnessed first-

hand the transformative power of the Bible. In May of this year, I travelled to Cairo, where I saw the incredible impact our supporters' generosity has made (see pages 3–5).

In Cairo, I joined Bible studies with young leaders, witnessing the profound difference the word of God is making in their lives. It was inspiring to see how sharing the Scriptures could bring others to the same lifechanging relationship with Jesus that I have found.

Through Jesus, the door, I have found purpose, direction, and an abundant life. And by sharing this message, we can open the door for others to experience his love and salvation.

#### Neil Rees Digital Publishing and Translation Advisor

I live in a village in the Chilterns, where my family attends a small village church, and we help to run the youth work. I have always been interested in history, languages, the Bible and technology, and I combine these together in my job.

## Tell us about your history with Bible Society.

I started working for Bible Society in 1997, when I was recruited as a programmer to develop software for indexing and typesetting. I went on to develop and improve software and digital solutions to help Bible translation and publishing. Often, people access the Bible on their phones these days, so I have helped make apps for the Scriptures in many different languages. For example, I look after 'ap Beibl', the Welsh Bible app, and recently I worked on apps for translations into Scots Gaelic and Irish Gaelic.

## What's your favourite Bible verse?

Micah 6.8, which tells us that what the Lord requires is that we act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with our God.

## I heard you were doing a degree in digital theology.

I am now doing a part-time MA in Digital Theology, which is the overlap of technology and Bible mission. A lot of things like AI are now hot topics and it is worth considering their applications in the context of Christian ethical values.

## What are your favourite English translations of the Bible?

The King James Version which, 400 years on, still sounds magnificent. However, we no longer speak like that, so to really understand the Bible, I like the Contemporary English Version. It's the only English Bible ever to be awarded the Plain English Society Crystal Mark award.

I also greatly admire the EasyEnglish Bible. This was translated for the millions of people round the world who may speak English as an additional language.

#### **Favourite Bible stories?**

In the Old Testament I love the story of Zelophehad's five daughters in Numbers 26, who felt that a law was unfair and persuaded Moses to change it. I am sure they were the first recorded women's rights activists. I also love the practical, down-to-earth advice in the letter from St James, who was probably Jesus's own brother.
